

This is a play about identity and the traces we leave on the world around us. It won the 2005 Arts Council's John Whiting award and was subsequently staged at the Crucible Studio Sheffield with performances from 27 March 2007.

You are who you can prove you are. You are what people think, and that's the easiest thing in the world to change. When Charlie, a young executive, reaches breaking point and decides to disappear, he pays a visit to a master of the craft in a seafront fortune teller's in Southend. Haunted by visitations from a pathologist who swears he is already lying flat on her slab, he begins a nightmarish journey to the edge of existence that sees him stripped of everything that made him who he was.

Leaving one's former identity behind and starting over seems to be an almost existential act; a yearning for good faith in a world that fetishes the fake. What makes you authentic? And how do you know you're real? These may not be new questions, but they are more relevant than ever, and no less terrifying – or unanswerable.



Musical comedy Murders of 1940 auditions: 29th October Macbeth auditions: 5th December for adults and children will be another date, check the website for details




"Imagine 42nd Street with corpses where the songs ought to be."

The creative team responsible for a recent Broadway flop (in which three chorus girls were murdered by the mysterious 'Stage Door Slasher') assemble for a backer's audition at an isolated country mansion. The house is filled with sliding wall panels, secret passageways, Nazi spies, a bumbling police inspector and a German maid who is apparently four different people - all of whom figure in the intrigue and comic mayhem which follows when the 'Slasher' reappears, striking again and again, and again. As the composer, lyricist, actors

and director prepare their performance, and a blizzard cuts off any possible retreat, bodies start to drop in plain sight, knives spring out of nowhere, masked figures drag their victims behind swivelling bookcases, and accusing fingers point in all directions. As suspicion mounts with the demise of each new victim until the 'Slasher' is finally unmasked - much to the relief of the audience, who will need a rest following the non-stop barrage of laughter. The production will hopefully provide a new energy to a classic who-dunnit spoof, combining the suspense of an Agatha Christie and the electricity of Baz Luhrman...with the madness of Benny Hill thrown in!

Shakespeare's tragic tale of ambition, power, deceit and murder comes to the Little Theatre. It tells of a supernatural prophesy, foretelling Macbeth's rise to King. However, it also tells of a line of Kings following from Banquo, another Thane of Scotland and one of Macbeth's closest friends and confidants. Can Macbeth defy fate and tighten his grip on the throne? In the ultimate game, will he win, or die? The battle lines between free will and something far more sinister are being drawn. The insidious lure of the unknown may be just too powerful to resist.



It is with the greatest sadness we have to inform you that Honorary Life Member, George Baker, sadly passed away on the 9th August, after a long illness, aged 95.

George joined the 'Rep' in 1962, after moving to Dunstable. His first performance was in a comedy 'Haul for the Shore' at the Old Town Hall. He developed his love for acting and directing whilst living in Northern Rhodesia (now Zambia), in the late 1950's.

He soon established himself as a 'stalwart' of the Rep over the next 45 years.

He not only acted and directed, in over 40 plays, but sat on the management committee and was Chairman of the 'Rep' for several seasons.
